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Cantemus Invites Audiences "To Sit and Dream,"
Announces New Ticket Policy

"Musings, reveries, daydreams, imaginings and re-imaginings" is how Cantemus Artistic Director Jane Ring Frank describes the program she has created for the chamber chorus's spring concerts on April 30 and May 1. "This collection of music and texts slyly looks to the past for inspiration, while boldly moving into the future. It ranges from re-interpretations of two of Bach's most famous chorales to heartfelt love songs to four rousing American spirituals," she said.

The program's title, "To Sit and Dream," is taken from a poem by Harlem Renaissance poet Langston Hughes. Composer Rosephanye Powell relies on jazz harmonies and blues influences to relay Hughes' re-imagining of a "problem world" made new. This expressive piece is a bridge to arranger and pianist Tim Harbold's "Marchin' to Zion," an old-fashioned gospel hymn, and the spirituals "Somebody's Knockin' at Your Door," "I Want Jesus to Walk with Me," and "I' Been in the Storm."

Contemporary composer Libby Larsen's "Love Songs" are a choral cycle composed on texts by 20th-century American women poets. Frank says, "One is a wild, driving

dance of spring, youth and freedom; one, a beautiful but mournful rendering of love lost but never forgotten; and one, based on a poem by Willa Cather, a deeply moving contemplation of love, rich and sustained, with warm and sonorous chords."

"Cantate Domino canticum novum" by contemporary Estonian composer Arvo Pärt plus modern re-imaginings of two well-known Bach chorale melodies, by Helmut Bornefeld and Ed London, round out Cantemus's spring program.

The concerts take place Saturday, April 30, at 7:30 PM at Christ Church of Hamilton-Wenham, 149 Asbury Street; and Sunday, May 1 at 4 PM at Central Congregational Church, 14 Titcomb Street, Newburyport.
